Radiation: Diseases Related to Ionizing Radiation Exposure

Veterans may be eligible for **disability compensation** and **health care benefits** for any disease that VA recognizes as related to military service or radiation exposure during military service. Surviving spouses, children and dependent parents of Veterans who died as the result of diseases related to military service or radiation exposure during military service may be eligible for **survivors' benefits**.

- **Presumptive Diseases Related to Ionizing Radiation Exposure**
- **Other Diseases Related to Radiation Exposure**
- **Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS)**

Presumptive Diseases Related to Ionizing Radiation Exposure

VA has recognized, or presumed, certain cancers as related to ionizing radiation exposure during military service. These are called "presumptive diseases."

If a Veteran who participated in a **radiation-risk activity** (including "Atomic Veterans") develops one of the diseases listed below, VA presumes the disease is related to ionizing radiation exposure during service. These Veterans do not have to prove a connection between these diseases and their military service to be eligible to receive **disability compensation**.

Cancers of the bile ducts, bone, brain, breast, colon, esophagus, gall bladder, liver (primary site, but not if cirrhosis or hepatitis B is indicated), lung (including bronchiolo-alveolar cancer), pancreas, pharynx, ovary, salivary gland, small intestine, stomach, thyroid, urinary tract (kidney/renal, pelvis, urinary bladder, and urethra), leukemia (except chronic lymphocytic leukemia), lymphomas (except Hodgkin's disease), and multiple myeloma (cancer of plasma cells).

Surviving spouses, children and dependent parents of Veterans who participated in a **radiation-risk activity** and died as the result of one of the diseases listed above may be eligible for **survivors' benefits**.

Other Diseases Associated with Radiation Exposure

If a Veteran who was **exposed to radiation during military service** (including "Atomic Veterans") develops one of the diseases listed below and meets other requirements, **disability compensation** may be provided, on a case-by-case basis, according to VA regulations.

Surviving spouses, children and dependent parents of Veterans who were **exposed to radiation during military service** and died as the result of one of the diseases listed below may be eligible for **survivors' benefits**.

Eligibility depends on how much radiation the Veteran received and other factors, such as the period of time between exposure to radiation and the development of the disease. For these Veterans, VA recognizes that the following diseases are possibly caused by radiation:

- All cancers
- Non-malignant thyroid nodular disease
- Parathyroid adenoma
- Posterior subcapsular cataracts
- **Tumors of the brain and central nervous system**

For Atomic Veterans, VA asks the Department of Defense's Defense Threat Reduction Agency* to document status as an Atomic Veteran and provide the actual or estimated radiation dose received by a Veteran.

Note: VA also will consider the possibility that other diseases not listed above were caused by radiation, if supported by medical or scientific evidence. To be eligible for disability compensation, VA must be able to establish that it is at least as likely as not that a Veteran's disease was caused by his/her exposure to radiation during military service.

Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS)

Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) is not associated with radiation exposure. However, VA has recognized ALS diagnosed in Veterans with 90 days or more of continuously active service in the military was caused by their military service. WHY I SERVE

No one has ever really asked me why I serve my country and similarly, I haven't ever sat down to really think of the reasons why. I have to go back to 1992 when my search for a college to attend started. Initially, I chose to apply for an Army Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) Scholarship while I was in high school. I was selected to receive a 3-year scholarship and the university I ultimately chose to attend offered to pay for the year that the Army was not going to be paying for. Honestly, I initially chose to serve my country so that I could get college paid for and have an almost guaranteed job when I graduated. I figured I would do my required lieutenant time to pay the Army back and then get out and get a "real" job.

As time progressed and I entered my first unit I learned to appreciate the job I had and the impact that we as an Army had on the rest of the world. In 1999 I had the opportunity as a Second Lieutenant to deploy to Kuwait as part of Operation Southern Watch. While in Kuwait, I met several local people who experienced the attacks and subsequent occupation from Iraq in the early 1990's and saw how much they appreciated the American forces for giving them their freedom and their way of life back. I learned that being in the Army was more than just a job, but a way of life and would give me life experiences that none of my friends in "real" jobs would have. It was an opportunity to make a difference in someone's life, whether that life was a Soldier in my platoon that I became a mentor to or the difference in the life of someone in a land far away. That gave me a reason to stay in the Army to serve my country.

Although our deployment to Kuwait was just 5 months long, the impact on our unit was great. The camaraderie and unit cohesion was definitely stronger after spending months in a tent with nothing to do but train your platoon. Though several Soldiers departed the unit upon our return, those that remained had a unique bond and similar experiences that they can only share with those that were there. I still keep in contact with Soldiers from that unit to this day. This trend continued with each deployment I went on, whether it was Afghanistan or Iraq. There is nothing quite like a combat experience in a land far from home to create a unique bond. It is this experience of living in tents, working next to each other 12 hours a day for 7 days a week that cannot be matched in a "real" job. Another reason I serve my country is for this camaraderie. There is nothing quite like it.

After subsequent deployments and finishing my command, I entered an Active Component/Reserve Component (AC/

RC) battalion. In this job my battalion was responsible for a collective training program that deploying National Guard and Reserve units went through prior to departing for theater. In this training, we were able to teach potentially lifesaving skills to Soldiers who previous to this training had only worked together on weekends and in the summer. We knew that what we were teaching and the lanes we were running would be the basis of each unit's ingrained battle drill reactions to what would be their real combat experience. Replicating a combat environment in the middle of Indiana was not easy, but the impact we had on the units was greater than we knew. Here it became the fact that I was making a difference and saving the life of a fellow Soldier that added to the reasons I was serving my country. There aren't too many "real" jobs that can replicate that.

Throughout these years and experiences, I also came to appreciate the little things in life that I might have missed had I not been in the Army. I learned to appreciate every day that I get to go home at night to be with my family after I experienced combat losses while deployed. I learned to appreciate a roof over my head after seeing the mud huts and half built buildings in Iraq and Afghanistan. I learned to appreciate the shoes on my children's feet after seeing shoeless kids in Iraq in the middle of winter. I learned to appreciate my country and all that she stands for after seeing those countries where people do not have the same pride. I always stood up as the flag went by in the parade as a kid, but I have learned to appreciate the flag of the United States and appreciate the Veterans who have served before me that protected that flag in the past and continue to do so today. The mere fact that I am able to serve this country that has given me so much is why I continue to serve my country today. I suspect that my lawyer fraternity brothers from college do not get this same sense of pride working their "real" job.

The opportunity to make a difference, to be a mentor, to save a life, the camaraderie and the sense of pride and respect are the reasons why I serve my country. A lot has changed from my ROTC scholarship days when the Army was something that was just going to get me through college to the point where I am at now: a thirteen year veteran of the Army. It has taken me this many years to sit down, think of and then to truly list multiple reasons for why I serve my country. Maybe that is why I still have not left to go get that "real" job!
